

According to Lednum, in "The Rise of Methodism," this appealing figure of those days who preached in his Captain's uniform, with his sword laid across the pulpit, and always with the patch over one eye, "was the first Methodist preacher that preached in Wilmington, New Castle, and other paces in that region and that, too, was early as 1769."

Records From 1820

Records of the congregation since 1820 show the names of all pastors who have served the church since that time, although the names of all the Methodist preachers who have preached here are not known. There is some question as to whether the Rev. John E. French is the 65th cr 66th pastor of the church. The Rev. George R. Bristor served the congregation twice, from 1877-78, and in 1881. This is the only instance in the pastor has served more than once, was the pastor here for five years, being succeeded next May by Mr.
